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Preface

I am not a poet, though I love to craft sermons, hymn texts, melodies, and compositions based on sacred texts. I am a student of theology, a planner of worship, a musical craftsman. When Martin Luther returned to Wittenberg from the Wartburg Castle to restore order, he entered into a period of liturgical and musical reform and, with Johann Walter's assistance, composed "spiritual songs" to be sung within his Latin and German masses. Luther's hymnody was born out of necessity and reveals a strong theological foundation, an esteem for the historic liturgy, and a pastoral understanding of the importance of congregational song for faith and worship. I view this collection of texts and tunes to be patterned after Luther's work. It spans a career as a seminarian and pastor, an educator and church musician, a composer and conductor. My hymns were born out of life experiences and theological reflection. Each hymn in this collection resulted from an occasion—a worship event, a confirmation class, sermon preparation, a university chapel service, a baptism, a church anniversary. These "spiritual songs" were composed as a witness to the faith we share; at the same time, they disclose particular facets of my own life.

I remember sitting in church with my mother and hearing her brash, nasal tone sound out the hymns while she moved her finger along the words and notes to help me participate in the service. I wrote my first hymn text before I entered high school, when my home church in Baltimore invited members to compose an anniversary hymn. I chose KREMSER as the tune but struggled with the words—so much so that I never submitted the text. When my home congregation celebrated its one hundredth anniversary in 2015, I revisited that youthful verse and began to revise it but then decided to compose a new text and tune for the occasion. Before the hymn was completed, however, riots and fire had erupted in the city, causing me to amend and amplify the text. For the anniversary service, I was invited to conduct a festival choir in an expanded hymn setting, not knowing that only a few days later, my nephew, who had been so moved by the occasion, would suffer a tragic death. Hymns reach deep into the experience of our lives and give us hope in the living God, especially when devastating communal and personal tragedies occur.

I am fortunate to have had the combined creative experience of poet, composer, worship leader, and conductor in bringing these hymns to life. They are not rare gems of poetry or music, but they are faithfully conceived and composed "through faith for faith" (Romans 1:17). I present them to you to enliven and deepen the church's faith and worship, and to affirm that the Holy Spirit is still

creating. If one hymn inspires the faith of one believer or enlivens one moment in one service for those assembled, then a lifetime of prayerful creativity will have been worth it.

This collection encompasses my work from 1971–1996 in seminary, graduate study, and parish ministry; and from 1996–2022 during my days of university teaching and supply preaching. A Chronological Index is provided in the Appendix to trace the order in which these hymns were written or composed. Several hymns have multiple tunes for the same text, and in a few instances (i.e. 65, 16, and 91) a more recently composed tune is included with an earlier text and tune. A Topical Index is provided in the Appendix to facilitate finding hymns for the church year and for particular themes.

I am not opposed to the improvement of my texts to strengthen their theological accuracy or to reflect contemporary language usage, though I do consider my tunes and harmonies to be well conceived. I welcome the wedding of my tunes to other texts for assembly worship. I have arranged many of these hymns in expanded settings, which may be used to introduce them to congregations. "Lord, increase our faith," the disciples begged. As we live with the effects of the debilitating coronavirus and gather once more to sing praises to God, may the Lord increase our faith through "spiritual songs" such as these musical offerings. I dedicate these hymns to the glory of God for use in public worship and private devotion, so that faith in the crucified and risen Lord may abound through the power of the Holy Spirit.
