PUBLISHER'S NOTE

Because finely crafted hymn texts have a poetic imagery of their own, Susan Palo Cherwien's hymns appear in text form in the first section of this volume. To enable their use by congregations, the hymns are also presented with music, beginning on page 42.

In addition to several widely used tunes, a number of new tunes by noted composers are included in this collection. Some of these were commissioned along with the texts for particular occasions; in other cases, the author wrote a text with a particular tune in mind; in still other instances, where no suitable existing tune could be found, a composer was invited to contribute a new one. These are not intended to be exclusive pairings, however. Composers are invited to let these hymn texts inspire other melodies and musical settings for assembly, soloist, or choir.

A radiant choir has pierced the night

Greg Aune, director of choral activities at Gustavus Adolphus College, commissioned this text for the 2017 *Christmas in Christ Chapel* program. As it was the 500th anniversary of the Reformation, Susan stated: "I have set a portion of Martin Luther's 1521 Sermon for Christmas Day in verse using a basic form like Luther's for the poetry. I drew from a lovely 1905 translation. Luther begins the sermon by quoting from Haggai 2:6–7, so I used that text as well. Luther waffles between present and past tenses and so did I, to portray the 'now' aspect of Incarnation." The tune VOM HIMMEL NEU by Robert Buckley Farlee was commissioned at the same time.

All the ways of God are justice

Cantor Jeffrey R. Pannebaker and the Rev. Connie A. Miller, on behalf of Saint Luke Lutheran Church and School, Silver Spring, Maryland, contacted Susan about writing a text in honor of the Rev. Dr. Paul Wee. Susan stated: "To honor Paul Wee, I focused on the concept of justice, especially drawing on the prophets. The opening line is from Deuteronomy 32:4—"All God's ways are justice." The tune forgotten Luther was composed by Pannebaker for the occasion of its presentation to Rev. Wee as a part of a symposium held at Saint Luke titled "Forgotten Luther," after which the tune is named.
