Introducing the NRSV Updated Edition

This 2026 edition of Sundays and Seasons is the first to adopt the New Revised Standard Version Updated Edition (NRSVue), which is now utilized across the full family of resources (Preaching, Bread for the Day, Worship Planning Calendar, etc.) as well as on sundaysandseasons.com. The NRSVue is an update of the NRSV instituted by the National Council of Churches, created by the Society of Biblical Literature, and first made available through Friendship Press. Its primary purpose is to reflect advances in biblical scholarship over the past thirty years, such as more recent study of the Dead Sea Scrolls, and updates in the English language. In some biblical passages these changes will be clearly noticeable, while in others they may be quite minor, such as a single word or punctuation mark.
