Starting with God

On Ash Wednesday we often ponder practices to do or habits to give up. Those are fine things. But they may cloud the fact that everything we have and all that we are come from God.

Without God, we would not be alive. Without Christ, we would not know forgiveness and eternal life. Without the Spirit, we would be alone in this world. Apart from God, nothing we know or take for granted would exist. This basic point is a fine start to Lent: All we have and know in life is a gift from God. We are not masters of the universe.

Paul grasps this at the beginning of Romans. It leads him to name God and Jesus five times in two verses. It leads him to derive his and the Romans' identity from God in Christ, who sets them apart, calls them saints, extends them grace and peace, and calls them beloved.

Too often in life we act as if everything depends on us. And we miss the point. This Ash Wednesday, more than identifying things we hope to do (or *not* do), let's acknowledge our dependence on God and embrace Christ's invitation to follow him to the cross.

Prayer

O Christ, we acknowledge our need for God, embrace your call to follow, and invite your Spirit to lead us forward. Amen.

I'm a singer who desperately wishes she could harmonize without having the notes in front of her. I admire those singers for whom harmonizing comes unbidden. I'm filled with "holy envy," as my internship supervisor used to say.
