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ISBN 9780800620363 ITEM012737 DIGITAL EDITION 2023 When I was asked if I would like to do a setting of the cycle of Advent-Christmas-Epiphany acclamations, my first reaction was, "Wow, what an opportunity! I've already experimented with some verses using handbells; this is a chance to do the whole thing." Now that the project is completed, my reaction is, "Wow, this was a big job!" Yet it has been a rewarding challenge to design something that would work well in a multiplicity of performance situations and also be accessible enough that almost any congregation could undertake incorporation of such a resource into its worship life, especially for these seasons that are so rich in significance for our lives of faith.

To assist in enabling the realization of these settings, here are a few observations and suggestions. The settings have many possible options for implementation. Do be creative and feel free to experiment and adapt to meet local needs.

- 1. Each acclamation begins and ends with the alleluias for the season. The proper verse for the day is sandwiched in the middle.
- 2. Two options are provided for the proper verses: either SATB choir, or unison choir/cantor.
- 3. Children's or youth choirs could sing the verses, perhaps using only the cantor's line. This is not just for adults. What a great teaching opportunity to "unpack" a bit of the significance of the text as it is being learned, relating it to the Sunday when it will be sung.
- 4. Organists can be creative in devising colorful registrations to "paint" the texts.
- 5. Dynamics are not provided to encourage directors to respond not only to the mood of a specific service but also to the performing resources as well.
- 6. In the Christmas and Epiphany verses, use bells or organ, never both simultaneously. If bells are not available, a piano or keyboard can substitute. Remember to play an octave higher than written since bells sound an octave higher than written.
- 7. Consider having the congregation and choir sing the refrain together, choir (if SATB) in parts, congregation in unison.
- 8. Consider printing the text of the verses in the service folder when choir or cantor sings them to be sure the text is heard clearly. Printing the text also serves to assist in "cueing" the congregation for the repeat of the refrain at the end of the verse.
- 9. Above all, fear not. These settings were designed to be accessible for all and should not require a major investment of rehearsal time in order for them to fulfill their goal of enriching worship. When preparing the verses, think text stress, look for the important words. Then the shifting metric patterns will feel very natural.
