One Liturgy, Two Languages

Look on pages 8–28. Here you will find the order of worship in two different languages—Spanish and English—side by side. Can you match the words in both languages that have the same meaning?

What about the Leftovers?

What happens to leftovers in your house? Do they get saved for later? What about food scraps that no one will eat?

After communion is over and worship has ended, the leftovers from the **Meal** (the bread and the wine or grape juice) can't just be thrown away. As Lutherans, we believe that the bread is now <u>both</u> bread <u>and</u> the body of Jesus, and the wine or juice is now <u>both</u> wine or juice <u>and</u> the blood of Jesus.

Our tradition says that these leftovers either are consumed (that means eaten or drunk) by people or animals or returned to the earth in some other way.

Do you know what happens to the leftovers from communion in your worshiping community? Find the person who takes care of them and ask them to share this information on leftovers with you.

Report on what happens to the communion leftovers in this space, and ask the person to autograph it.
